

Guidelines for authors

Yearbook of Rural History - Jahrbuch für Geschichte des ländlichen Raumes

Manuscripts

A typical manuscript will not exceed 80.000 characters (including spaces). Manuscripts that greatly exceed this should be discussed with the editor before submission.

Manuscripts should include:

- Abstract of 500 words.
- 3 to 6 keywords

All authors of a manuscript should also include their full names, affiliations, postal addresses, telephone numbers and email addresses on the cover page of the manuscript. One author should be identified as the corresponding author. Please give the affiliation where the research was conducted.

Authors, particularly those whose first language is not English, may wish to have their English-language manuscripts checked by a native speaker before submission. This is optional, but may help to ensure that the academic content of the paper is fully understood by the editor and any reviewers. Please note that the use of any of these services is voluntary, and at the author's own expense.

Tables, maps and figures

Tables, maps and figures should each be submitted as a separate file.

Please number tables/maps/figures consecutively with Arabic numerals, and indicate clearly in the article text their approximate positions. Permission to reproduce copyright material must be obtained by the author and sent to the Editors.

Spelling

Please use UK spelling.

Italics

Italicise foreign words or phrases unless they are sufficiently familiar, e.g. *modus operandi*, *en route*, *ex officio*. Titles of books, periodicals and other works, and names of specific ships and so on are to be italicised (but not abbreviations preceding the last, e.g. HMS, USS). Names of foreign bodies, such as institutions or political parties, are not italicised.

Numbers

Please spell out numbers up to twelve, except where they are attached to percentages, units or sums of money, and use Arabic numerals thereafter.

Dates

Please use '10 December 1948' in the text, '10 Dec. 1948' in footnotes. Use 1930s (not 1930's), the twentieth century (not the 20th century).

Quotations

Use double quotation marks, with single quotation marks only for quotations within quotations; mark missing parts using [...]. Quotations of 50 words or more should be broken off from the text and indented from the left-hand margin as a separate block of text

Citations in Endnotes

For footnotes use the footnote system of your text-processing program. Semicolons separate several citations in one note. When a note contains not only the source of a fact or quotation in the text but related substantive material as well, the source comes first. A full stop usually separates the citation from the commentary. Such comments as "emphasis mine" are usually put in parentheses.

Bibliographical citations

Book [by Author(s)]

Up to two authors are listed; if there are more than two, only the first appears with the addition "et al."

Book [by Editor(s)]

Up to two editors are listed; if there are more than two, only the first appears with the addition "et al.", add "(ed.)" or "(eds.)"

- Maxine Berg (ed.), *Markets and Manufacture in Early Industrial Europe*, London/New York 1991.

Article in an Edited Book

Journal Article

Reference Cited in Another Work

Later References

If referring for a second time to a previously cited work, it is not necessary to repeat all details in full. Include enough information to identify the work and other information such as page numbers, for example:

- Smail, *On Deep History*, 46.

Ibid.

The abbreviation *ibid.* refers to a single work cited in the note immediately preceding. It must never be used if the preceding note contains more than one citation.
